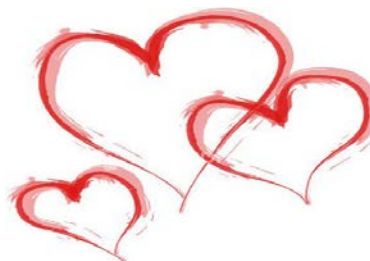

GUIDELINES: Since its inception the Endowment Committee has distributed the earnings as follows: 50% reinvested in the endowment, 2% to UMW Mission Giving, and 48% to support the purpose of the UMW of the Pacific Northwest Conference. In consideration that we have reached capital in excess of \$80,000, it was felt by the committee that to reinvest 50% each year was not necessary. Therefore, it was unanimously passed by the committee and then the Conference UMW Executive Team to distribute the earnings with 25% to Mission Giving and 75% to help others.

Mission Giving is allotted to missions who have applied for grants with the National office and is given based upon need. There are 5 channels of mission giving: Pledge to Mission; Special Mission Recognition (Pins); Gift to Mission; Gift in Memory and World Thank Offering. Designated Giving is money donated for specific national and international missions such as a Brighter Future for Children and Youth, Assembly Offering, World communion Scholarships, Call to Prayer, etc. Because this money is designated, it will “sit” in the bank for the specific designated mission. Thank you to the local units and the district treasurers for all you put into mission work.

CENSUS GOALS

Our goal for 2017 is to have 100 percent district reporting and all our 27,000 local units represented in the census. The census relates directly to United Methodist Women's efforts in fulfilling our core commitments: spiritual growth, leadership development, transformative education, service and advocacy and organizing for membership growth.

You will recognize some changes on the form. There are several new questions that are focused on strategies around increasing membership, our social justice priorities, and training needs. Our goal is to increase membership by 2 percent at the district level by 2020, so the feedback received through the census is critical in how we plan strategically to meet this goal.

Let's be inspired to share our rich legacy of mission and all that United Methodist Women has to offer, so that we can celebrate another 150 years of turning faith, hope and love into action on behalf of women, children and youth around the world!

Galatians 3:28 "There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus."

After reading, "Building a Movement to End, The New Jim Crow," by Daniel Hunter our first step is to know which position works best for us to further our advocacy work for United Methodist Women. What category do you fit in? Helper, Advocate, Rebel, or Organizer?

UNDERSTAND YOUR ROLE IN SOCIAL CHANGE – To reach its goal, a movement must include different approaches to change and a great variety of people filling different roles. **Each role is important!**
Helpers: are people who see an individual in need and try to meet that need.

Helpers often provide direct service, such as opening their homes, educating about job interviews, offering therapy for family members, or feeding hungry people. They open their hearts and respond personally with the resources they have available.

Advocates: see a need but also see systems out there with resources, even if they're broken and unfair. Advocates help people navigate those systems, perhaps doing social work, public advocacy, or impact litigation. They use knowledge of the system to help people fill their needs, bending the system so it provides every ounce of justice or resources it can provide.

Organizers: have another approach. When looking at problems, their instinct is to bring together those who are hurting. They often change the rules of the system. Unlike Helpers, who provide direct services, or Advocates, who tend to work inside the system.

Organizers traditionally create pressure by building groups external to the current system.

Rebels: driven by passion and energy, speak truth to power and do so with conviction. They are associated with public protest and direct action, using tactics like sit-ins, marches, and civil disobedience. Rebels are impatient with small reforms and are uncompromising in their struggle for major changes in society. Rebels are often public in their work, even if it might carry personal risk for them.

Reminder: Pacific NW Conference United Methodist Women's priorities are: 1) Immigration, 2) Economic Justice/Wealth Inequality, 3) Climate Justice, 4) Maternal and Child Health, and 5) Mass Incarceration of Communities of Color. May God Be With You All,

"On the evening of January 9, 1952, at Buck Hill Falls, the report of the committee on Racial Practices was brought to the Women's Division by Mrs. James Oldshue, chairman. An artist had written the new Charter of Racial Policies on a large wallboard visible to the entire group. After discussion, the charter was adopted unanimously by a standing vote. ..." We Believe

1. We believe that God is the Father of all people of all races and we are His children in one family.
2. We believe that the personality of every human being is sacred.
3. We believe that opportunities for fellowship and service, for personal growth and for freedom in every aspect of life are inherent rights of every individual.
4. We believe that the visible church of Jesus Christ must demonstrate these principles within its own organization and program.
5. We believe that the Women's Division as an agency of The Methodist Church must build in every area it may touch, a fellowship and social order without racial barriers.
6. We believe that progress may be advanced by declaring emphatically those policies on which the Women's Division is determined to move in order to come nearer the ideal.
