SOCIAL ACTION

(Priority - Mass Incarceration of Communities of Color)

In the United States, the school-to-prison-pipeline, also known as the school-to-prison link or the schoolhouse-to-jailhouse track, is the disproportionate tendency of minors and young adults from disadvantaged backgrounds to become incarcerated, because of increasingly harsh school

and municipal policies. Many experts have credited factors such as school disturbance laws, zero tolerance policies and practices, and an increase in police in schools in creating the pipeline. I believe we need to bring to all of our schools, *Restorative Justice*. Restorative justice is an approach to justice in which the response to a crime is to organize a mediation between the victim and the offender, and sometimes with a wider

community (schools) as well.

There will be a workshop, **School to Prison Pipeline**, given by speakers Jodi Martin and Shane Gardner at the annual meeting in Vancouver. I hope to see you there.

This year 284 quilts were received. This is an increase of 22 guilts. Last year West Highlands UMW brought 3 quilts and this year 25 guilts. That is an increase of 22 guilts!! Thank you to all who brought quilts. A special thank you goes to Rev. Jo Ann Shipley, Vancouver Heights UMW, who blessed these beautiful guilts. Quilts were given out to the UMW District Presidents to be distributed to mission agencies in their areas working with women, youth, children, and babies. In that distribution 60 quilts were given to the Northwest Detention Center in Tacoma. Some other places of distribution were Tacoma Community House, Atlantic Street Center, Mary's Place in Seattle, Vida's Ark in Vancouver, Mount Vernon Hispanic Ministry, Nooksack Indian UMC, the Support Center in Omak and Vanessa Behan Crisis Nursery in Spokane. This is just a few of the places that received these 284 quilts. Next year the Crest to Coast Missional District will be leading this project and they are hoping to increase the number of quilts brought to Annual Conference. If you did not send a quilt to conference this year, please consider sending one next year. If you sent one, how about 2 next year. Together we can increase the number of smiles on the face of a child receiving a guilt filled with love and prayers.
