PROGRAM RESOURCES

The 2021-2022 United Methodist Women Reading Program is available for viewing online at unitedmethodistwomen.org. You'll find a listing of all the book titles by the five categories (Education for Mission, Leadership Development, and Nurturing for Community, Social Action, and Spiritual Growth) and a brief summary of the book.

In the November/December 2020 issue of "response" magazine is an excellent article on the 2021-2022 Reading Program (pages 28-35). The article explains the requirements for each of the four Reading Program Plans. Also, a brief summary of each book in the Reading Program is listed.

There are "4" Bonus Books this year. The four books are "Rise! From Caged Bird to Poet of the People, Maya Angelou," "Women United for Change: 150 Years in Mission," "Pushout: The Criminalization of Black Girls in Schools," and "Finding Peace in an Anxious World." Bonus books count as two books.

In the United Methodist Women April E-News (received April 8), there was a letter from Andris Salter with updates to the 2021-2022 Reading Program. Thirty-four new book titles have been added to the list. Faith Talk podcasts can now be counted in the category of Spiritual Growth. There are three movies and documentaries that count toward the Reading Program ("Just Mercy," "The Hate U Give," and "Pushout." The Mission u studies also count as Bonus Books.

One of the 2021-2022 Reading Program titles is "Gum Moon: a novel of San Francisco Chinatown" by Jeffrey L. Staley. "Gum Moon (Cantonese for 'Gold Door' or 'Golden Gate') is the remarkable coming of age story of a Chinese-American girl, Mei Chun Lai, who is sold in 1898 at the age of three to a cruel brothel keeper.

In the story, a sympathetic prostitute befriends Chun, but two years later, at the height of plague quarantine, Chun is thrust into a bewildering new world. A young Methodist woman rescues her and places her in a home for abused and trafficked girls. The home is destroyed in the 1906 earthquake and fire, but Chun (aka "Maud") survives. In an attempt to raise funds to rebuild the home, Maud and a group of seven other Chinese children embark on a 6-month cross-country singing tour. Performing for President Theodore Roosevelt in the White House is the highlight of the journey, but when the matron of the home suffers a breakdown, 13 year-old Maud must find within herself the strength and resolve to lead the band of children home. The novel is based on events in the life of the author's wife's grandmother." [from OCLC World Cat summary]

I highly recommend reading this novel. It was a hard book to put down at times. What was going to happen next to Chun? Author Jeffrey Staley spoke at the Puget Sound Missional District Annual Meeting held on September 14, 2019 at Edmonds United Methodist Church. This book can be found at Sno-Isle Libraries (Marysville, WA).

My personal home project, supported by Edmonds UMW and UMC, is in Nigeria. Chidinma Okoro

A Day Begins A Journey - Chidinma Okoro

When the idea came to me to follow in my mother's footsteps after she passed in 2015, I did not envision where the journey would take me. My mother, Sarah Onyirinnaya Nwakudu, a true and practicing Methodist

woman showed and lived an exemplified life dedicating most of her life in the affairs of women, children and youth in Methodist Church and the community at large back home in Nigeria. In 2018 I travelled backed to my home country Nigeria to figure out what I could do to help lift the lives of the underserved in the community. I was introduced to an early childhood education school in a local Methodist church, All Saints Academy, Okweukwu in Abia State. The state of disrepair of the old church building, built in the 1930s, turned into classrooms brought tears to my eyes. I made a commitment to refurbish it and add more classrooms to accommodate the need of the growing children population.

The classroom refurbishment project started self-funded, and I subsequently received assistance from my local unit, Edmonds United Methodist women. The project was completed in record time using direct labor and close supervision onsite and via WhatsApp video. The expanded classroom project was more capital intensive.

Mission Giving

Again, with Edmonds UMW assistance in their own way, the expansion project which commenced in August 2019, comprises a block of three classrooms, an office, a Sick Bay (a section of the school to be used for medical purposes), a 4-stall toilet system and outdoor washing hand basin with dedicated water tank, landscaping and a playground equipped with ageappropriate swing set and jungle gym.









The playground equipment water tank and landscaping were made possible by funding from Dave and Kris Gillespie grant administered by the Edmonds United Methodist Church. The local church's impact in my ministry has been tremendous. The EUMC organized a noisy offering and raised money to enable me to provide chairs/desks/cubbies and school supplies. I am touched beyond words by the outpouring of support from my local Methodist church community to help augment the funding needed to complete the projects.

It has been an enriching journey; making disciples, providing safe environments and improving the lives of the little ones in the community. The journey continues

SOCIAL ACTION

Dear UMW Sisters,

I hope you are all faring well, and enjoying these longer days of spring. I am interested in what the women (and men) in your local church are doing to help, or combat problems in your local community.

Even though my local Arlington United Church does not have a UMW: (—women are caring for those needing help—whether for transportation, getting food, assistance in cleaning or maintaining their apartment or home, staying in contact via phone or email or sending cards. Those that knit or do quilting continue to provide scarves, hot pads, baby items,

blankets, etc. A fun activity our folks did was to write notes and sign 350 Christmas cards which were taken to two of our senior housing facilities and to the Rehab Center, along with Christmas candy, then 8-10 of us sang Christmas carols outside the windows of the residents. For Easter, a similar group delivered plastic Easter Eggs and sang "Easter Carols!" at one place, then serenaded women attending an "Easter Tea" at a retirement center.

We all have become increasingly aware of the seriousness of so many critical issues affecting life, our environment, and our world. Networking with Faith Action Network is an ecumenical way to be learning about important actions being discussed and voted upon in our state legislature. We can help make a difference by listening and discussing with other about concerns, sharing our opinions, and getting involved at whatever level you are willing. You are invited to join United Methodist Women members and friends for a four-part Bible study on the sacred place of children and youth in God's eyes, antiracism and interrupting the school-to-prison pipeline.

What can I expect? This study includes four 90-minute sessions:

Embracing New Life (Colossians 3:1-17; Romans 12:1-

Embracing the Gifts and Leadership of Children (Acts 16:16 19, Matthew 19:13-15, Luke 2:39-52, Jeremiah 31:15-17 and Matthew 2:16-18)

Reimagining the Role of Women in Society (Numbers 27:1–8, Matthew 15:21–28 and Luke 18:1–8)

Unfamiliar Identities: Embodying New Possibilities for Interaction with All Women (Luke 15 + Ephesians 6:10-17)

Each session will build on the previous session. We encourage you to register for and attend all sessions.

We believe that God is presently active in the world. The Bible is not just a story we read about the past; rather, the Bible points to a Gospel story that is alive and at work in the present, as well. God seeks justice and liberation for all people. God's love flows freely towards children and youth. The school-to-prison pipeline is contrary to God's vision for creation.

A variety of gifts are needed in the work of interrupting the school-to-prison pipeline. Just as there are many parts to the body and many varieties of spiritual gifts, so there are many ways of being an "interrupter."

"That's always stuck with me," Burton continued. "Every time I see Joyce, I think, 'I'm part of a doggone movement that is already transforming the world' and it causes me to stand taller and do more to please God!"
