#### **HOW WILL OUR PURPOSE ADJUST TO THE NEW NORMAL?**

In 2020 every United Methodist Women meeting was by Zoom. In January this was a response to winter snow blocking passes but before the snow melted COVID 19 blocked events. This was a new experience for me but I educated myself using the Zoom Help Center. United Methodist Women National provided resources and practice sessions invaluable for our virtual Zoom Annual Meeting on October 17. 

# LINDA HAY RECEIVES CHARTER FOR RACIAL JUSTICE AWARD 2020

On October 17, 2020, at the United Methodist Women Pacific Northwest Conference Annual Meeting Ja net' W. Crouse, Conference president, presented the Charter for Racial Justice Award to Linda Hay. Rev. Joyce O'Connor-Magee described Linda's accomplishments:

## LINDA HAY IS A WOMAN ON A MISSION!

Linda has a special call to work with her Native American neighbors. When employed by the Indian Health Service, she found an affinity for native culture and learned of their unique needs. With her congregation of Goldendale United Methodist Church, she reached out to the local Big River Youth Council (BRYC) that develops leadership within a circle of Native youth. Linda and others empowered BRYC to

send members to national conventions including the United Methodist Women Assembly in 2018. Youth stepped into leadership roles, many leaving small rural homes to experience large cities for the first time. Linda ensured funding for Native children to attend the church's pre-school. She helped the church provide tutoring programs for BRYC. She personally mentored Sarah Gould, who is now in her second year at the University of Washington – having won a 4 year Presidential Scholarship. Sarah has participated in Mission u and Annual Conference events. Linda feels like a proud momma!

Linda has served at all levels of United Methodist Women holding offices locally and in the Seven River's District. She organized mission teams to the Salt Lake City UMCOR Depot, worked in the church's soup kitchen, and set up offerings of "egg money" for missions with members literally exchanging farm fresh eggs for donations.

Linda's enthusiasm recently followed her to a new home in Walla Walla where she is working to reestablish units in the district and mentor existing units. She is missed in the Goldendale unit and congregation that she loved and challenged but she continues to contribute prayer shawls and quilts. She has been a wise and insightful friend.

Linda Hays is a woman of insight, determination and deep, infectious joy. Saying no to Linda's passion for ministry and mission is hard. And why would you? She makes mission not only possible but fun.

#### **RACISM, A CHALLENGING BUT TIMELY SUBJECT**

"Jesus Loves the Little Children, All the Children of the World, Red and Yellow Black and White. Jesus Loves the little Children of the World" This began my, and possibly your, education into the churches view of racial differences. This came to mind recently when, after a discussion at our United Methodist Women Pacific Northwest Conference Racial Justice Committee Meeting, I was asked to write an article on this topic for our United Methodist Women Conference Newsletter. There was talk about how people are growing tired of the demonstrations, confrontations, and violence that we have been seeing related to the long standing violence against people of color. Robin DeAngelo's book, White Fragility, has asked us to reexamine these feelings and, many more, about our feelings in regards to the ongoing outcry against racism. How tired people of color must be of the hundreds of years of mistreatment and prejudice focused on them. We must continue on our own journeys of educating and challenging ourselves into how we can be a part of the solution. As Robin DeAngelo points out, it won't be easy and we may make mistakes but we must ask for forgiveness and continue on the journey.

Our denomination has made mistakes that the United Methodist Church has acknowledged and asked forgiveness for with our Native American, and Black and brown sisters and brothers. <u>Our Social Principles</u>, II 162, III. A) Pp. 35, address the church's stance.

"Women of United Methodist Tradition" have been working against racism since the late 1800s. (See Racial Justice Timeline). In 1941, the policy to only hold gatherings in places without any form of racial discrimination was adopted. The Charter for Racial Justice Policies was adopted in 1962 by the Women's Division. It was later adopted by the General Conference upon the Women's Division's petition. We, as United Methodist Women, continue to work for Racial Justice through our Social Action Priorities, most recently thru study of the School to Prison Pipeline.

In facing this challenge to grow in understanding of Racism and our part in it, the following scripture comes to mind.

"Let us not grow weary in well-doing, for in due season we shall reap, if we do not lose heart. So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all men, and especially to those of the household of faith."

Galatians 6: 9 & 10.

I encourage all United Methodist Women units of our conference to use this challenge to become part of the Racial Justice Charter club by reading books on Racial Justice, discuss books read, take part in webinars offered, use resources found on the <u>United Methodist</u> <u>Women website</u>, collect articles on this subject, and check out the videos on Racial Bias gently suggested by our dear friend and sister, Noriko Lao. These are found under <u>TED</u> Talks on Racial Bias on YouTube.

As a mother of a son I love dearly, this struggle was brought home to me by reading the book <u>Between the World and Me</u> by Ta-Nehisi Coates. He is educating his teenage son about the realities of growing up as a black boy in the U.S. I used to pray every time my son got behind the wheel of a car. I can't imagine the fear a mother might have that her son would be shot just leaving the house. As women of faith let us continue the fight of making this a better place for ALL God's children.

### IN LOVING MEMORY OF NORIKO LAO AND HER LEGACY AND SHARING



Our hearts were saddened to hear the passing of our small but mighty Noriko Lao. She left behind a true legacy of selfless service to others. After retiring from the World Bank as a Senior IT Systems Analyst, she dedicated the next 20 years of her life in full service to those less fortunate. From working with the Red Cross as a case worker at major crises like 9/11 and the Fukushima disaster to serving with United Methodist Women and Habitat for humanity and working at grass-roots levels in her local community to aid the homeless.

Noriko Lao set a precedent in sharing. Sharing space in her own home to house people who were homeless. Sharing how to save up so they could get a place of their own. Sharing her time to volunteer with organizations like Habitat for Humanity in Whatcom County and Interfaith Coalition. Sharing her strength to help build homes for others. Sharing her entire home, giving all money from its sale to Interfaith Coalition as a legacy gift.

She lived an independent and active life and greatly enjoyed outdoor activities, in particular, hiking and cross country skiing with friends. She was ever-practical and efficient-those who knew her will remember

her traveling great distances with diminutive suitcase. Though focused and quietly contemplative much of the time, she also had a wonderful sense of humor.

She served on the Program Advisory Group for United Methodist Women National from 2012-2020. When legacy fund team were developed they selected her to represent the Western Jurisdiction. She was the fireball of compassion and love for United Methodist Women. She worked tirelessly, resolute and down to the last detail, she had the grace of making herself indispensable to the task at hand with her boundless energy.

She joined me for international mission trip-Creating Sacred space with Bartholda Manderville and Rev. Marlu Scott at Union Theological Seminary and Decker Memorial Foundation from April 22 – May 1, 2015. She did not stop or drop out of the mission project in spite of broken arm from a fall while at Lazy F. All of us were waiting that Sunday morning, and Jenni Yeoh prepared a small cake because her birthday is next week.

The Ruth Award 2017 was presented and awarded to her who came to the United Methodist Women at age 28 by way of Foundry United Methodist Church in D.C. She was introduced to the mission of the church through the vitality of United Methodist Women. She served in both conference and district positions, as a member of a team to Jurisdictional conference.

She stands for the rights of all people - for immigrants, for children and youth, for women young and old and for the inclusion within the United Methodist Church of members of the LGBTQ community. She acts globally and locally. Noriko has proclaimed "God is the Creator of all people. We are all God's children. We must carry on our legacy of faith, love and action.



Her legacy of compassion and genuine love for her Lord is not etched in her heart but will echo in eternity. She was an inspiration and a witness. A tiny might with a giant heart for mission and United Methodist Women. May we follow her footsteps and carry on the mission inspired by her witness. May you be the wind beneath our wings and an angel looking down on us. You will be missed. We love you.

In our state we have Atlantic Street Center and Tacoma Community House which are two United Methodist Women founded and supported organizations. The United Methodist Women website and Response Magazine have maps and the locations of United Methodist Women projects and the joint projects with other United Methodist organizations.

The United Methodist Women National organization acts as a steward of these funds which is disbursed according to its budget. Pledges to Mission, World Thank Offering, Gift in Memory, Gift to Mission, and Special Mission Recognition sent to the national office, fund the entire program of mission and leadership development. The budget is voted on and approved by a volunteer

board of directors who are United Methodist Women members and elected from the jurisdiction organization of United Methodist Women. Members were voted on this summer (by Zoom) in our Western Jurisdiction as well as the other jurisdictions. since we had to cancel our normal inperson event. In recent years the
quilt group has made from 40 to 60
quilts to be donated via the Pacific
Northwest Annual Conference. Since
Annual Conference was a Zoom
gathering, the Leadership Team
decided to try the online quilt sale.

We gathered photos of all the quilts that had been made (all 68 of them!), made up a name for each quilt (who wouldn't be intrigued by a quilt called Flower Power or Tropical Fantasy?). We used google photos to create an album of the quilts, along with size of the quilt and price and an album of craft and bake sale items. The most popular items in this part of the sale were masks (and baked goodies).

We used Square, an online sales tool to accept credit and debit cards. We advertised the quilt, craft, and bake sale widely to our church family, as well as on "Next Door," a neighborhood-wide social media presence, our church public and private Facebook pages, and we encouraged people to share the information with family and friends.

### **FORMATTING TIP: WORKING WITH TABS**

When I served as the Communications Coordinator for the Seattle United Methodist Women a number of years ago, I wrote a number of articles about some of the tricks to better formatting, and a number of people told me they found them helpful.

When someone emails me a document, I've often noticed the use of spaces or tabs to create text that is lined up in columns. If you are doing a quick document where appearance isn't important, this can be the quickest way to go but it is not necessarily the best way if you want professional looking results. Below are some examples of why you shouldn't and how to use tabs for best results.

You can use spaces to line things up.

This Is Using Spaces To Line Things Up.

This approach works fine but the words don't always line up exactly and changing fonts could affect how things line up. Here is the same example using a different font:

Computers, like typewriters, offer preset tabs every 5 spaces which can be handy but can create a somewhat arbitrary look to your columns. Below is an example of using preset tabs:

This Is Using Preset Tabs

A better way to control your spacing exactly is to set your own tabs where you want them. With proper use tabs are one of the most powerful tools in a word processing program.

There are several ways to set tabs.

#### **Option 1: Use the Tab Menu:**

In Microsoft Word click on the paragraph that you want to add a tab to with the right mouse button. This will bring up a menu that includes a *Paragraph* option. At the bottom of the menu is a button labeled *Tabs*. Click on this; it will open the Tab menu. From there, you can specify where, and what type of tab you want to set. Different types of tabs can be combined in the same paragraph.

**Option 2: Use the Ruler:** First you need to make sure your Ruler is open. In Word 2007 or newer you can select the *View Ribbon* and make sure that *Ruler* is checked.

Once the *Ruler* is open click on the paragraph you want to add a tab to then click on the bottom of the ruler; a tab will be added where you've clicked. Now you can hit the tab key and the text you add will align with your new tab (the preset tabs will be ignored).

## Example of using user set tabs to line things up:

If you wish to change a tab position, simply click on the tab symbol, and drag it to the position on the ruler you want. You can remove unwanted tabs by dragging them off the ruler.

There are five different kinds of tabs available in Microsoft Word: *Left, Right, Center, Decimal, and Bar.* You can select these tabs in several ways.

**Following Option 1** when you are in the Tab Menu, simply select the type of tab you want.

Following Option 2, you can either double click on the ruler which will open up the *Tab Menu*; simply select the type of tab you want. OR find the small white box at the top of the vertical ruler; it contains a black character. This character represents the type of tab that will be inserted if you click on the ruler. By clicking on this box, you will cycle through the varieties of available tabs.

- **Left tabs** align text on the left side and are represented by **L** (*Left tabs are the default type of tab*).
- Right tabs align text on the right side and are represented by

- Center tabs align text by the center and are represented by

- Decimal tabs align numbers by their decimal point and are represented by


