### **CHOOSE LIFE**

Once again our United Methodist Women Pacific Northwest Conference Annual Meeting was by zoom. Once again we selected Climate Justice for our Social Action Priority. Our keynote speaker Elizabeth Chun Hye Lee from National United Methodist Women focused on climate justice. In a poll she asked for our source of energy where we live. Fossil fuel contributes to 80 percent of climate warming and renewable energy only 8.5 percent. Climate change is personal for her. Her father had COPD and constantly checked his air monitor. When he died this year, the mortuary flooded. The United Nations lists climate change as the most systematic threat to humans displacing women who are primary caregivers (80%), damaging health, harming blacks and Hispanics, hurting mothers and infants. We must replace fossil fuels with clean and renewable energy such as solar and wind by 2050. Liz invited everyone to Just "Energy for All, Strategy and Capacity


She closed with a quote from Deuteronomy 30:19: "Choose life so that you and your descendants may live."

# IRENE MONSON RECEIVES CHARTER FOR RACIAL JUSTICE AWARD 2021

Twelve years ago the United Methodist Women Pacific Northwest Conference created guidelines for Racial Justice Clubs in local units. This year we recognized sixteen local units with clubs.

In October 2021 we awarded our racial justice award to a woman who provided the leadership for her unit's Racial Justice Club that exceeded the requirements: Irene Monson from Fairwood United Methodist Women. As co-chair of her unit's Social Concerns Board she stimulated awareness of systemic racism. She started with a discussion of the Racial Justice Charter. She encouraged members to read and discuss books on racial and social justice. She promoted and organized special programs on racism, immigration, and refugees. These included a Tacoma Community House presentation about "The Immigrations Challenge and How We Can Help," a talk by Clyde W. Ford "Let's Talk About Racism" at Bellevue 1st United Methodist Church, a program by Pastor Ferdie Leinado from the Philippines about his immigration experience, a discussion with refugees about World Relief, and a unit "Conversation About Racism," In the process Irene raised consciousness of racial equity and justice in her unit and inherent bias in individuals and her congregation.

## FORMATTING TIPS-UNDERSTANDING PARAGRAPHS

This article is especially for those who use the computer but not expertly. If you do not use a computer, read no further.

When many of us learned to type, it was on a type writer, either manual or electric. With a typewriter, in order to control where a sentence would wrap to the next line, it was necessary to use the Return Key.

Computers have changed that!
While you can type the same way on a computer, it is not necessary. The computer, if you just keep typing, will automatically wrap a sentence down to the next line, and will even add hyphenation when appropriate. I typed this paragraph without ever using the Enter Key until the very end of the paragraph.

More importantly, there are many reasons why you don't want to type using the Enter Key like you would the Return Key. When you hit the Enter Key to break a sentence, it not only forces the next word to start on the next line, it also creates a new paragraph. A new paragraph automatically starts with a capital letter. Also, any formatting instructions that are part of your paragraph are reapplied. That means, if you've formatted your paragraph with an indented first line, your line will be indented. Also, bullets and automatic numbering will be reapplied.

#### Example:

- This sentence was typed using the Enter Key to
- Start the next line of text.

Notice that bullets start in the wrong place and the capitalization of "Start".

A better way to force a line to break after a specific word is to press the Shift and Enter Keys together. These two keys, used together, will force the line to break where you want without starting a new paragraph.

#### **Example:**

I broke this line after the word "sentence" was typed using the Shift & Enter keys together to start the next line of text.

Notice that, while the line is broken after the word 'sentence', the rest of the formatting is correct.

# **HONORING OUR FOREMOTHERS' LEGACY**



On March 23, 1869, in Boston, Massachusetts, Clementina Butler and Lois Parker informed six women members of the Methodist Episcopal Church about the desperate healthcare and educational needs of women in India. Their Call to Action raised funds to send Isabella Thoburn, a teacher, and Clara Swain, a doctor, to India. The meeting in March led to the formation of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, the first of many Methodist women's mission organizations, to address the injustices imposed on women and girls in the 19th century. United Methodist Women is their successor, and we celebrate 150 years of changing the lives of women, children and youth.

#### **TOGETHER, WE MAKE AN IMPACT**

From the beginning, United Methodist Women members have led the way in countless endeavors, from founding schools, hospitals and clinics in the early 19th-prison pipeline and working for maternal and child health today. Our membership is comprised of women from all backgrounds and experiences, compelled by their Christian faith to serve in places they never imagined. They are unified in the pursuit of women's progress and their development as leaders in their churches, work settings and communities. Organized for mission, United Methodist Women operate

from a biblically based understanding that equips laywomen to grow in their faith through prayer, study, fellowship and action, and to work for social justice to promote a more equitable, safe and healthy world for women, children and youth. This is what distinguishes United Methodist Women from other organizations, and attests to its longevity and relevance, today and especially in the years to come.

#### **BUILDING A LEGACY**

United Methodist Women members' commitment and faithful service has led our foremothers' vision forward for 150 years. Yet the needs, difficulties and unjust practices faced by women, children and youth continue. I learned about the injustices the Native communities have endured for years, about the lack of drinking water, housing, access to health care in some instances, etc. As a result of that experience, I connected with the Big River Youth Council, a group of middle and high school age youth in the Goldendale community.

Being a member of United
Methodist Women for twenty-seven
years has provided education about
other communities throughout the
US and the world that live in similar
conditions and has provided ways to
serve and support them. Most
recently, as Member Education &
Interpretation Coordinator, I
established a relationship between
Pacific Northwest United Methodist
Women and the Nome Alaska
Community Center and Deaconess
Cindy Johnson who serves the

migrant population in South Texas. I am thrilled to say that most of our districts and units jumped on board in a variety of ways, supporting both populations. I have been a district president, treasurer, Conference Membership Nurture & Outreach and Member Education & Interpretation and have grown from each experience. I am looking forward to serving on the Conference team as Vice President.

# LINDA KEY -CHAIR OF NOMINATIONS

Linda grew up in Kansas City Missouri before moving out West to first, Northern California then to Washington. Raised and baptized in the Mennonite church while living in the Midwest and then becoming a Methodist after moving to Washington. Linda always felt the need as a Christian to be connected to other Christians and the church was the perfect place. The camping programs provided such positive experiences for the youth so the local church at Grandview established the group, Kids for Kamp". in her twenties. The first United Methodist Women she attended was in Moscow, Idaho, where they lived for a short time. Sharon became more active when they moved to Sedro Woolley, Washington in the mid 70s. She has held most offices locally over the years. When Donna Perez was president of the Puget Sound District, Sharon was asked to be on the district team. In her eight year tenure on the Puget Sound District United Methodist Women team, she had the opportunity to be coordinator for Reading Resources, Social Action, Membership, and Spiritual Growth, as well as, President of the Puget Sound District. Sharon has served on the Committee on Nominations and as Social Action Coordinator for United Methodist Women of the Pacific Northwest Conference.

# ELIZABETH WILLIAMS -MISSION COORDINATOR FOR SOCIAL ACTION

As the new Social Action Coordinator of our Pacific Northwest Conference of United Methodist Women, I will do my best to lead as we put our efforts into facing two major issues which have been chosen as the emphasis for all United Methodist Women: creation justice and the mass incarceration of people of color.

I'd already been involved in the creation justice movement since 2015, but this past year during the pandemic, rather than let it be a wasted time, I made a special commitment to be proactive by immersing myself in all things related to creation justice by reading extensively, participating in Zoom trainings, presentations, movies, podcasts, webinars, and discussions, as

well as finding concise time-saving information on how to advocate for the implementation of public climate policies from local to international. Most importantly, I went through the training and was commissioned as an EarthKeeper in the United Methodist Church and I would highly encourage any of you to do the same.

At Providence St. Joseph Care Center in Spokane where I have worked in recreation therapy for the last ten years, I have been active on the Alliance of Climate and **Environmental Stewards (ACES)** Team and especially as a key member of the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Team being an advocate and educator trying to make sure there is no discrimination in any form towards caregivers, residents, and patients. I have been fortunate to have traveled to about thirty countries, studied four foreign languages in addition to sign language, and personally seen the effects of injustices and inequities in communities around the world.

I am a lifelong active United Methodist and am reminded of adhering to John Wesley's principles, by doing no harm, doing good, and staying in love with God. We need to use our critical thinking skills so we are not unknowingly coerced into following the greenwashing tactics of some in the fossil fuel and agricultural industry, nor inadvertently wish-cycling, nor letting our money be invested negatively. Please know: Net zero just means not adding new emissions and does not mean zero emissions.

As Michelle Pope, the keynote speaker for the Pacific Northwest United Methodist Church laity session said, "We need hybrid worship AND hybrid discipleship where we go out into the community." We have the opportunity to bring others along with us. Creation justice appeals to young and old. There are lots of opportunities to invite new persons in our communities to take action with us!

I am here to be a resource to you, your local and district United Methodist Women units, your faith communities whether you have an active creation justice team or just think maybe you ought to form one; for decisions your trustees, missions, and hospitality teams need to make; or perhaps ideas for programs for children, youth, or for worship. I can help get you connected to local networks of national non-profit climate justice organizations such as 350.org. Some of them have interfaith teams within them.


