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
A President's Perspective Arlene Feroe, Puget Sound Missional District President

Hope this message finds everyone "safe and well" during this upsurge of the Delta variant. The new reading season is upon us and I wanted to provide you with an updated Reading Program Guide that has the book summaries for the "34" new book titles that have been added to the list. Check pages 52 through 64 for the book summaries for the new book titles for 2022. One of the new books in the Leadership Development category is Michelle Obama's "Becoming."

If you have been looking for some novels to read, four novels have been added to the list for 2022. The titles are "Before We Were Yours," "The House on Lowell Street," "The Leavers," and "Small Great Things."

There is a letter from Andris Salter, UMW Operation Officer at the beginning of the Guide. In her letter, she mentions that "Faith Talk podcasts can now be counted in the category of Spiritual Growth. You must participate or listen to two Faith Talks podcasts. *If you participate/listen to three, it will be counted as a Bonus Book in the Spiritual Growth category.*

There are "3" movies and documentaries that count toward the Reading Program. The three movies are

- Just Mercy
- The Hate U Give
- Pushout

There are four Bonus Books this year. The four books are "Rise!: From Caged Bird to Poet of the People, Maya Angelou," "Women United for Change: 150 Years in Mission," "Pushout: The Criminalization of Black Girls in Schools," and "Finding Peace in an Anxious World."

Mission u studies also count as Bonus Books.



coffee, tea, and homemade cinnamon rolls as we visit. Our women's weekly Bible Study has finally resumed, involving 7-12 ladies so far. We're studying Carolyn Arends' 2021 "The Universe in 57 Words; Seven Days Inside the Lord's Prayer." It's a "WOW!"

Lanny and I enjoyed a week's vacation the end of Oct.—first time in the Tucson, AZ, region. 'Learned a lot of history, was introduced to Martha Summerhayes *"Vanished Arizona:* *Recollections of the Army Life of a New England Woman*" living in the late 1800's, first printed in 1908.

We visited *Tubac's Presidio State Historic Park*, where an oil painting depicting Martha's first birth, when native Apache women brought gifts and a fawn skin papoose basket embroidered with blue beads for the baby boy.

I also found a copy of Pastor Todd Burpo's 2010 book, *"Heaven is for Real,"* retelling the experiences his almost 4-year old son, Colton, shared about his trip to heaven and back during serious surgery for a ruptured appendix.

Both of these spell-binding books renewed my hope in the goodness of individuals. How can YOU make a difference in someone's life? We start by praying, caring, listening, helping, and reflecting God's love.

A BOOK STUDY

The updated 2021-2022 United Methodist Women Reading Program Guide is available for viewing online at unitedmethodistwomen.org

Many new book titles added in April. For readers looking for novels to read, there are four novels. The novels are "Before We Were Yours" by Lisa Wingate, "The House on Lowell Street" by Linda A. Keane, "The Leavers" by Lisa Ko, and "Small Great Things" by Jodi Picoult.

One of my joys as a reader is the opportunity to travel to new countries from the comfort of my recliner. One of the books from the Reading Program (Education for Mission category) is "A Road Called Down on Both Sides: Growing Up



in Ethiopia and America" by Caroline Kurtz.

Caroline Kurtz grew up in the remote mountains of Maji, Ethiopia in the 1950s. Inside her mud adobe home with her missionary parents and three sisters, she enjoyed American family life. Outside, her world was

shaped by drums and the joy cry; Jeep and mule treks into the countryside; ostriches on the air strip; and the crackle of several Ethiopian languages she barely understood but longed to learn.

Caroline felt she'd been exiled to a foreign country when she went to Illinois for college. She returned to Ethiopia to teach, only to discover how complex working in another culture and language really is Life under a Communist dictatorship meant constant outages – water, electricity, sugar, even toilet paper. But she was willing to do anything, no matter how hard to live in Ethiopia again. Yet the chaos only increased – guerillas marched down from the north, their t-shirts crisscrossed by Kalashnikov bandoliers.

When peace returned, Caroline got the chance she'd longed for, to revisit that beloved childhood home in Maji. But maybe it would have been better just to treasure the memories. [from OCLC World Cat summary]
