

DOES COVID-19 HAVE US "CIRCLING THE WAGONS"?

The past two years have brought us social isolation as well as economic, physical/medical, and even spiritual uncertainty. It's only natural to look inward and withdrawal a bit when our lives feel out of control. But in United Methodist Women we are called to do the opposite — we are called to remember our own blessings and to reach out with our time, talents, and resources to help women, children, and youth who are in need.

We know that so many in the U.S. and around the world struggle with racial injustice, with the disproportionate effects of climate change; disadvantages in accessing medical care, or an education. These are but a few of the many needs that our United Methodist Women organization addresses every day. Proverbs 3:27 says "Do not withhold good from those to whom you should give it if it is within your power to help" (New World Translation). This is important work we are doing — and we each have an opportunity to be an integral part of our organization's success.

Because I'm relatively new to United Methodist Women, I find it helpful to remind myself of our overall structure. Our United Methodist Women organization is divided into seven jurisdictions in the U.S. (ours is the Western Jurisdiction). Within our jurisdiction are five conferences (including our Pacific Northwest Conference). Our Pacific Northwest Conference in comprised of five districts, and each district has a number of individual local units. At every level of United Methodist Women, women serve in leadership roles for specific periods of time. They are women of all backgroundsyoung/old, busy mothers, LGBTQ, racially diverse, empty nesters (like me) — who dedicate a measure of their time, talents, and resources to the work of serving others. Our organization's ability to affect a positive impact would simply not happen if not for these wonderful volunteers.

Many of you have served your local United Methodist Women units, districts, or even conferences in a leadership capacity, and I'd like to

challenge you to think about serving at the Jurisdiction level. Our Nominations Committee is looking for motivated women who might be interested in submitting their name as a candidate for consideration for a leadership position on the 2024-2028 Western Jurisdiction Leadership team. It is so important for us to have all of our conferences represented at the jurisdiction level and I know we have so many talented women in our conference. Any travel is reimbursed so please don't let finances be a reason for not applying.

We have learned so much about meeting virtually in the last couple of years. We continue to wait for the day when we can meet in person. With our challenge to learn new ways of engagement, we are now embarking on a journey to conduct "hybrid" meetings with an in-person component along with a meaningful virtual component.

The United Methodist Women Annual Meeting is currently researching possibilities for hybrid meetings. Traditionally, we would meet over 2 days, but this year our meeting will be conducted for only about 2 hours. With the large geographic area of our conference, it is understandable that members from our eastern missional districts from as far away as Idaho may not wish to travel so far for such a short meeting.

On January 18th, I attended an online meeting hosted by the United Methodist Women national office for program resources. Over 160 Program Resources officers from around the country attended, both new officers and those with experience in this mission area.



SO YOU WANT TO TALK ABOUT RACE BY IJEOMA OLUO



So You Want to Talk About Race, was published in 2018 by Seattle writer and speaker Ijeoma Oluo. It is listed on the United Methodist Women 2020 Reading Program list as a bonus book and bonus books count as two books.

It was included on recommended reading lists from *Time, The Washington Post,* and *The Seattle Times* and spent time as #1 on the *New York Times* bestseller's list. The author's work about race, feminism and social justice have appeared in numerous publications, and she is an Editor-at-Large at the Establishment. Oluo was named one of the most influential people in Seattle by Seattle Magazine in 2018 among several awards and honors,

Oluo was born in 1980 and raised by a white single mother in a majority white, liberal area north of Seattle. She graduated from Lynnwood High School and Western Washington University in 2007, and at a young age became a single mother to two mixed-race sons. Oluo began her career in technology but turned to writing after the 2012 death of Trayvon Martin, who was at the time same age as her son, Malcolm.

My Kent United Methodist Women Susanna Wesley Circle studied this book monthly via Zoom in the summer of 2020, shortly after the George Floyd murder. We advertised this book study in our church newsletter and we gained several new members. Each of the seventeen chapters begins with a question. A few examples are, "What is cultural appropriation?", "Why can't I touch your hair?", and "What

if I don't like Al Sharpton?" This book is written for both white people and people of color. Oluo uses humor and poignant anecdotes from her past in addition to facts, statistics, and stories to back up her points and express her opinions on race and racism in America today.

In the Book Discussion on page 259, Oluo writes, "I do believe that if you are white, this book will help you to avoid harming people of color in discussions of race. I also believe that if you are a person of color, this book will help you feel more confident in your feelings, experiences, and boundaries." Imani Gandy, senior legal analyst for Rewire. News writes, "Ijeoma's book is a nuanced and refreshing frank discussion of race relations from a Black perspective. It's sharp, funny and incisive. I consider her book essential reading for any white person looking for a greater understanding of race." My United Methodist Women circle found So You Want to Talk About Race to be thought provoking and informative, and I highly recommend this book for you to read or for your United Methodist Women group to read together as a Racial Justice Book Study.

MEET OUR 2021 RACIAL JUSTICE AWARD WINNER

Racial justice is the systematic fair treatment of people of all races that results in equitable opportunities and outcomes for everyone.

I would like to thank all the women in my Fairwood United Methodist Women for helping our group achieve the 2020 Social and Racial Justice award and in learning and sharing more about equality for all people.

As the coordinator for Social and Racial Justice for our women's group, I presented to the group various opportunities to learn more on how we could become stronger advocates for all people in our community. Throughout the last two years, I presented a variety of activities.

We started just prior to Covid and were able to attend a presentation of a play depicting a court room for detainees to be released from the detention center in Tacoma, a small group of us attended Clyde W. Ford's presentation of Let's Talk about Racism, a few of us attended an open house at the Redmond Mosque to learn more about their faith as we sat around tables sharing a meal and conversations with the women. We were able to go into their prayer room while prayers were being said. (This was a very special time). In addition we study the books, Be the Bridge by Latasha Morrison and Me and White Supremacy" by Layla Saad Our pastor Ferdie Llenado shared his immigration experience as a person of color in the wake of the 9/11

terrorist attack. We worked with World Relief in their work with refugees and collected gift cards and yarn for people in the Tacoma Detention center and for those who were being released. These were done on Zoom as Covid kept us from attending activities in our community.

The new year will begin with a mini workshop led by Nica Sy on her experiences and work in our local community and schools and the book Pushout by Monique W. Morris. In January our book club is reading and discussing Face the Mountain by Daniel James Brown and later in the year we are planning a field trip to the new Sea-Mar Museum of the History of Chico and Latino Americans located in Seattle. This museum is dedicated to the Latinx culture and their history in the NW. Then we will gather together for a lunch at an ethnic restaurant.

Having the support of the women in my church has made all of this possible for me to fulfill my aspirations in Racial Justice. This past November I was honored with the individual Pacific Northwest Conference Racial Justice Award. I would like to thank the Pacific Northwest Board and all the women in Fairwood United Methodist Women for their encouragement, support and participation.

HOW TO BECOME A CHARTER FOR RACIAL JUSTICE CLUB

In order for a local unit to become a member of the Charter for Racial Justice Club, the unit must carry out one activity from each section during a calendar year. Thereafter, the unit must complete one activity annually. If membership lapses, the unit must begin again with three activities.

Local units will work with a report to their District Mission coordinator for Social Action.

The Racial Justice Committee will meet for consideration of the revisions of criteria annually.

Units will be recognized for becoming a Charter for Racial Justice Club.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST CONFERENCE UNITED METHODIST WOMEN CHARTER FOR RACIAL JUSTICE CLUB

Annually, every Charter for Racial Justice Club Unit must read and review the Racial Justice Charter. This will be found on the website of, unitedmethodistwomen.org, printable or downloadable.

The PNW Conference United Methodist Women Charter for Racial Justice Committee has worked to create new and universal (2018) criteria for the CRJ Club that will make participation both more accessible and more meaningful.

"We recognize racism as sin and affirm the ultimate and temporal worth of all persons. We rejoice in the gifts that ethnic histories and cultures bring to our total life. We commend and encourage the self-awareness of all racial and ethnic groups and oppressed people that leads them to demand their just and equal rights as members of society."

"There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male or female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus.' – Galatians 3:28

OPTIONS FOR FULFILLMENT UNIT PROGRAMMING

From Tools for Leaders: Resources for Racial Justice, complete one Bible study, one workshop, or one worship service included within Charter.

In your unit or a small group, study the portion of the Racial Justice Timeline that spans your lifetime. Make written reflections and share them with other group members.

Share, (both positive and negative), local newspaper articles, United Methodist Women reading program books, and documentaries relating to racism. Forward the information shared with a short report to your District Mission Coordinator for Social Action. We may use them for display at either Mission U or the United Methodist Women **Conference Annual Meeting**

Hold a letter-writing or postcard writing correspondence party supporting or lobbying for racial justice legislation or policy.

UNIT ENRICHMENT

As a unit, attend a worship service of a church, synagogue or temple with a majority ethnic background different from your own. Be certain to inform the leadership of your intended visit.

Watch documentary or read book containing racial justice themes with your unit, circle, or church small group. Discuss the movie using these 3 questions: Who is being exploited?, Who benefits from the exploitation?, What are we going to do about it?

Have a member of your unit sign up to receive free email updates from either: The Sentencing Project, sentencingproject.org, or Colorlines, colorlines.com, Equal Justice Initiative, eji.org.

Be creative, develop a Racial Justice learning experience for your unit or church.

Present a program on equal education, housing, employment or medical care exploring how race may have been a factor or implicated in the area.

Plan jointly with a group of a different racial/ethnic background:

Programs from the United Methodist Women Program Resource Book at one or more meetings.

Book reviews using books from the Reading Program with special emphasis on books related to minority groups and persons.

Study groups using one of the current (racial justice) study themes.

Ecumenical resources on social iustice.

BEYOND THE LOCAL UNIT

Host an international tasting party, cultural fair or other event. Be certain to integrate a racial justice element into the programming.

As a unit or with the church, sponsor a refugee family.

For one month scan the daily news media, (TV/newspaper, advertising, pictures, and/or children's literature) to ascertain the degree of ethnic/ racial/minority stereotyping portrayed.

Use the information in one of the following ways:

Design and present unit programs.

Share information with administrative body of your church.

Share with Sunday School classes.

Share with youth group.

Publish results of survey in local, church news media.

KENT UNITED METHODIST CHURCH RECEIVES \$102,000 GREEN POWER SOLAR GRANT FROM PUGET SOUND ENERGY



Kent United Methodist Church is the recipient of a \$102,000 competitive grant from Puget Sound Energy to fully fund the installation of a solar panel system. This project, which is being spearheaded by the congregation's Creation Care Team, is part of the church's overall emphasis on saving energy and reducing emissions from the church building. The team is leading the congregation in responding individually and as a church to care for God's creation and help the environment.

In April 2021, several agencies of the national United Methodist Church pledged to achieve net-zero greenhouse gas emissions across the organizations/ ministries, facilities, operations and investments by 2050. They acknowledged that the United Methodist Church "has long affirmed our individual and collective responsibility to address the

unfolding climate crisis." In light of these values, the United Methodist Church said it was "called by our faith, informed by science, and led by our relationships with impacted communities" to respond urgently.

Several members of Kent United Methodist Church's Creation Care Team were inspired to apply for the grant after attending the Just Energy for All webinars and the webinars presented by United Methodist Church Global Ministries Creation Care Network.

According to Jim Head-Corliss, lead pastor at Kent United Methodist Church, "this grant will help us to take a next step in our transition to renewable energy while partnering with PSE to further educate our congregation, our wider community, United Methodist Churches in the Pacific Northwest and across our country. We look forward to sharing

the positive benefits of renewable energy with a diverse range of faith communities in the greater Kent area."

Puget Sound Energy is committed to supporting organizations that serve families and individuals in its communities. In this round the company, through its Green Power and Solar Choice programs, has awarded over \$900,000 in total grant funding to local organizations in its electric service area to install new solar projects. The grant, funded by PSE's Green Power and Solar Choice customers, brings local solar projects to PSE's electric service area while providing support to grant recipients through lower utility bills for lowincome or Black, Indigenous and People of Color (BIPOC) communities and the organizations that serve them.

Kent, Washington has been named among the Top 10 most ethnically diverse cities in America and Kent United Methodist Church has a strong history of supporting the local community. For over 20 years, the congregation's Shared Bread program has assisted Kent residents with rent, water, and PSE bills. In 2021, over \$70,000 was distributed through this ministry. Other programs supported by the church include Kent HOPE (emergency shelter for women and children), Catholic Community Services, NW Trinity Mobility Project, Kent-Meridian Hub, Atlantic Street Center, Church World Service Crop Walk,

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Kent Food Bank, Pediatric Interim Care Center, St. Stephen's Housing Association (transitional housing), and a car camping program in the church's parking lot.

The design and installation of the project will be completed by MAD Energy NW of Auburn, Washington, an organization that specializes in solar projects and certified Net Zero solar arrays. Once installed, the system is expected to produce over 41,000 kilowatt hours per year, saving the church significant money on electricity bills. The church will use all the solar energy it generates first. Any extra generation will be banked to draw from when the church is consuming more energy than generating.

The congregation is committed to reducing their impact on the earth's resources and has made a number of positive improvements, including double-paned windows, LED lights, heat pumps, WiFi thermostat for the church's large sanctuary, timers on electric heaters, and recycling and composting programs. Additionally, the congregation hosts recycling events for the City of Kent in the church parking lot and has adopted their street for regular clean up. As a recipient of the grant, they are aligned with PSE to solve several challenges at once: the installation of solar panels to support the expansion of cleaner energy and a healthier environment, lowering energy-related operating costs at the property, and making the push to a more inclusive clean energy future.




