UNITED METHODIST WOMEN REBRANDED UNITED WOMEN IN FAITH

During our 150 years in mission, our organization has adopted a new name more than 25 times. In 1972 we became United Methodist Women. In 2022 United Methodist Women officially REBRANDED as **United Women in Faith**.

United Women in Faith remains the only official women's organization of The United Methodist Church but opens the door to women of other faiths and allows women to remain members during divisions. A national membership option is available. The traditional structure at the conference, district, and local levels are unchanged.

The changes are based on research guided by the Board of Directors that included surveys, focus groups, and interviews with over 24,000 women from United Methodist and other faiths.

The New Wineskins Campaign is spreading the news about these special changes during the transition. Explore the new website https://uwfaith.org for an overview along with new and improved programs.

The calling cards are Faith, Action, and Sisterhood. The new logo shows the new

I am really excited to tell you about another opportunity

we have to be a part of the work being done by Deaconess Cindy Johnson near Brownsville, Texas. Cindy and I touch base regularly. The last time we talked she thanked Pacific Northwest United Women of Faith again for the beautiful baby/ child blankets we sent this past winter. She commented that prior to the arrival of the boxes full of guilts, the children were being given a very thin, gray blanket, meant for a family of five. When the children saw the brightly colored quilts and knitted blankets, some with puppies, Donald Duck, Mickey Mouse, and kittens, they smiled from ear to ear. Thank you again for that huge effort. Cindy has recently been "appointed Project Manager" by her bishop for a facility being built to temporarily house individuals and/or families who need shelter. As well as five "cabins", there will be an office for an attorney and for a medical provider. The sweet part of this is that the Mennonites' are providing the exterior building materials, the Amish will build the structures, at no cost! Cindy is looking for others to provide the "interior" of each cabin, including furnishings, bedding, a computer, etc. The estimated cost is

\$5000 per cabin. I began to ponder how we could help. It came to me that we have five districts which would break down to \$1,000/district. There are at least 10 units in each district which would mean \$100/ unit! That seems so doable to me! The deadline for the money would be late summer. I brought this up at the Conference meeting yesterday and everyone was very excited to be a part of this permanent project. I communicated with Cindy last night...we are the first and only conference, so far, to respond. It won't be a "done deal" until your district lets me know that you are willing to be a part of this wonderful project. I look forward to hearing from you!! Blessings on you,






FOR RACIAL JUSTICE, COMBINE UNITED WOMEN IN FAITH BOOKS WITH MOVIES

Two books in the Reading Program have powerful counterparts as movies.


Margot Lee Shetterly, Hidden
Figures: The Untold Story of the
African American Women Who
Helped Win the Space Race
(Leadership Development). This
book tells the story of four talented





African American women who were "human computers" in Hampton, Virginia, and used pencils, slide rules, and adding machines to calculate numbers for launching rockets and astronauts into space. In the background are the challenges facing blacks in segregation during the Civil Rights movement and Space Race. The 2016 movie Hidden Figures focuses on three of these women.

Erica Armstrong Dunbar, *She Came* to *Slay: The Life and Times of Harriet Tubman* (Nurturing for Community).



This book tells the life story of Harriet Tubman, who was a famous conductor on the Underground Railroad. In 13 trips she led 60-70 people to freedom from Maryland from 1849 to 1861. During the Civil War, she led an armed expedition and worked as a spy. She became a suffragist and advocated for the aged. The 2019 movie Harriet begins in the 1840s when Harriet escapes to Philadelphia and ends in 1863 during the Civil War when she leads black



soldiers to free 750 slaves. When I visited friends in Maryland in 2019, I was able to visit the sites linked with Harriet Tubman, a joy since she is my hero.

Considers reading these books in your local unit and then watching the movies together.

The books are \$10 each.





It was a pleasure to see the film again, especially with the book discussion fresh in our minds. There is a tentative plan to screen another movie next year to coincide with the United Women in Faith Reading Program.

We recently completed the inspirational book, "Love is the Way: Holding on to Hope in Troubling Times," by Bishop Michael Curry, who is the presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church in the United States. The memoir of his life as a young black man who began

worshiping with the Episcopal Church during his college years, and ascending to the highest administrative office of the church outside the United Kingdom was a joy to read. Bishop Curry's commitment to his Christian pastoral vocation to members of all walks of life was truly a model of love and compassion.

The book we are currently reading as part of the United Women in Faith reading program is "The Lifesaving Church: Faith Communities and Suicide Prevention," by Rachael A. Keefe, an ordained pastor of the United Church of Christ and a suicide survivor. Even though it is a challenging subject for our reading group, we are approaching it with interest. We want to be ready to help members of our churches and communities who struggle with great personal burdens.
