WHERE THE MONEY GOES 2023

FIRST, LET'S HEAR ABOUT WHERE THE MONEY COMES FROM, THE SOURCES OF OUR FUNDING...

<u>United Women in Faith is trusted</u> with pledges and donations from individual members as well as mission partners and anonymous donors who have a heart for mission. The national office is committed to good stewardship of this generous support.

The Five Channels of Giving (pictured below) show the various ways that our members give undesignated funds to our organization. When local members give, a portion of the Pledge to Mission is kept by their respective



unit and conference for its own administrative and membership development (A&MD) expenses as well as local mission. The remainder of the Pledge and the other channels of Mission Giving is forwarded to the national office. Therefore, our members' giving supports both local, national, and international work aligned with our mission! At the national level, the elected Board of Directors votes on the budgeted spending for each year.

In addition to these sources of funding, United Women in Faith also receives bequests and holds endowments that significantly support our work. We currently have an active <u>Legacy Fund Endowment</u> <u>Campaign</u>, which will be an ongoing support of income, ensuring that our important work will always continue.

National Mission Institutions

We support nearly 90 NMIs across the United States that offer vital services to and advocate for women, children, and youth in vulnerable communities. In 2022, more than \$1.6 million was provided in grants to Community Centers, Residential Treatment Centers, and Women's Residences within the network.

International Mission

We support international partners that are enhancing the capacities of local and regional women leaders and supporting economic development programs for women and youth. We support Regional Missionaries and personnel serving in their home regions with the church and ecumenical and grassroots partners in educational and empowerment programs. Our international work empowers women and youth to find local solutions and make positive, measurable changes in their communities.

Office of Deaconess and Home

Missioner

Deaconesses and Home Missioners are laypeople who are called by God to be in a lifetime relationship in The United Methodist Church for engagement with a full-time vocation in ministries of love, justice, and service. Together they form a covenant community that is rooted in Scripture, informed by history, driven by mission, ecumenical in scope, and global in outreach.

Organizational Support

Funds are also used to support services that are critical to making the programs listed above possible. These services include:

- Board and staff development
- Fundraising
- Accounting and financial services
- Grants and scholarships administration
- Human Resources
- Information technology
- Event planning
- Communications and publications

United Women in Faith does not fund projects and programs that:

- Don't benefit women, children, or youth
- Don't comply with our UMC Social Principles
- Are administered by discriminatory organizations

In addition to the work mentioned above, we also own and operate the Church Center for the United Nations (CCUN) located in New York City across the street from the United Nations; and the Brooks-Howell Home Retirement Home, originally founded for deaconesses located in Asheville, NC. These operations are primarily funded by the rental and service fee income that they derive and are overseen by some of our national office staff.

Each year we release an Annual Report which describes the work we were able to do together and includes our audited financial information. You can read notes from our key leaders, see pictures and stories about projects, view the financial reports, and imagine the possibilities for the coming years! In addition to the work we do with our members on training, service, and social action, we award grants and scholarships to deserving organizations and individuals. The recipients and purposes of the grants and scholarships are released each year in our Grants Disclosure.

The theme of this newsletter is to share how we can "Go and Do Likewise." One of the most incredible things about the United Women in Faith is that we are constantly working to educate ourselves on the issues facing women, children, and youth worldwide. But how can we take that a step further here in the Pacific Northwest? How can we impact those women, children, and youth here in our communities?

One way we can make an impact coming this fall/winter is through our new partnership with Faith Action Network (FAN). FAN is a multi-faith advocacy group here in Washington. I contacted FAN because I believe many of our core values and interests are aligned. With our new partnership, we will be advocating at the Capitol during the next legislative session with the help of FAN on the issues near and dear to our organization—specifically, the issues facing the climate, women, and children. Additionally, I will be working with FAN to review upcoming bills that align with our desire to improve the lives of women and children in our communities. This will allow me to share that information with all of you and HOW you can reach out to your legislators

to share your thoughts on these bills.

Before all these wonderful opportunities to advocate as United have a virtual

advocacy 101 course with FAN on August 21, 2023 from 12:00 noon to 1:00 pm. Register now for Lunch and Learn - Advocacy 101 with **United Women in Faith**

This is one way we will be able to make an impact on a state-wide level this upcoming year.

But how can we make an impact in our communities? This year, I want to challenge all units to reach out to local foster care agencies and women's shelters to see how best we can serve the women and children they care for. I would recommend asking if the women and children need basic supplies, clothes, luggage, etc., and doing a church-wide drive to provide those items. I will provide a list of foster care agencies at our conference later this Fall. Please get in touch with me if you have more questions about how this might work.

Want to know more about how we can make an impact this year? Please reach out to me, and I would be happy to do an in-person visit with your unit or district or an online Zoom to discuss a personalized plan for you!

Finally, please send me your Racial



SPIRITUAL GROWTH-LOOKING OUT WINDOWS INSTEAD OF LOOKING INTO MIRRORS.

I hope you have been blessed with a renewing, inspirational, and restful spring and start to summer. With the Spiritual Growth Retreat and Mission u, we have been given great opportunities to be inspired, challenged, and connect.

Our new bishop, Bishop Cedric D. Bridgeforth, has challenged us to follow the Command of Christ put forth in Luke 10:25 - 37 to "Go and do likewise," as he instructed the lawyer in the story of the Good Samaritan. We are asked to "get neighboring" by (1) Praying with our feet, (2) Healing with our words, and (3) Loving with our resources.


The bishop suggests we look out our windows instead of looking in the mirror to determine who our neighbor is and what is needed. We may start by looking in a mirror at our history to be inspired but then take that inspiration to meet the needs of others. In the June 29th edition of Faith Talks (found on the UWF website), Ashley Boggan, author of Never the Less American Methodists and Women's Rights, talked about Susanna Wesley and how she valued Education for her daughters at a time when girls were not educated. How she led an afterchurch study when a substitute pastor wasn't measuring up. The "study" grew to 200 in membership. called to "Go and do Likewise."





What an exciting time to get involved in the ministries and mission of Tacoma Community House! I had the privilege of meeting with the new Executive Director, Aimee Khuu, recently. She comes to the organization with a wealth of administrative and organizational skills from the Providence Hospital system. Her father was an immigrant from Vietnam and she has lived int that country as an ESL teacher and volunteer. She has a passion for refugees and helping people in new situations.

And there are so many new ways to get involved at Tacoma Community House. Though the name suggests a very local ministry, their approach is to assist a wide variety of people and needs. Presently 250 immigrants and

refugees are served on site. About 70% of those participating in the language and citizenship classes are Ukrainian! They can also receive pro bono and low bono legal assistance when navigating the legal hurdles to citizenship. If you watch the news and see the plight of the people in Ukraine and think, "I wish there were something I could do to help," Tacoma Community House might offer that "something." While monetary assistance is ALWAYS needed, if you want a more handson approach, Talk Time might be an option. You could meet with a small

group for about 10 minutes and engage in conversation with them. You would get a list of vocabulary words they are studying and talk to them about their culture, their struggles, how they are adapting to their new situation, and so on. What a personal way to experience the life of one of our newest residents! TCH provides English and citizenship classes, employment and legal services, and GED preparation.

And then there is the REACH program, Resources for Educational Advancement, Careers, and Housing. Their mission is: At The REACH Center, our mission is to equip and embolden young people to succeed in education and employment through a strong network of dedicated partners. The staff is committed to helping meet the needs of every young person. Tacoma PRIDE awarded REACH the 2023 Emerald Award for their outstanding work.

As far-reaching and ambitious as the programs sound, small ways exist to get involved and support Tacoma Community House. Aimee shared that she would love to see a couple of picnic benches in front of the facility so teens and neighborhood folks could have a relaxing place to meet and chat. Whatever gifts and skills you have to share, there is an outlet for your talents at Tacoma Community House.
