





She taught at the University and other local colleges, became an advocate for public education through the local School Board, state PTA, and National PTA, and was a project director for reading and discussion programs in Delmarva Libraries.

Daughter Jennifer Talbot is across the river in Wenatchee with her husband Tony and their three sons and daughter, ages 18-9. Their oldest daughter lives with her husband and two children in Spokane. Ja net' with Dale selected Trinity United Methodist Church before they found a home. Her first experience with United Women in Faith began here in 2000. She started at the local unit as vice president and then president, advanced to Seven Rivers District in 2004 as Secretary for Program Resources (4 years) and then Vice President (1), and joined the PNW Conference in 2009 serving as Social Action (4), Vice President (4), and member Nomination Committee. From April 2018-October 2022 she was President.

Again, she was president for her local United Women in Faith at Trinity and then Bridges UWF at 1st Wenatchee UMC until fall September 2023. Twice she taught classes for Mission u (Native American Survival and Roma). United Women in Faith has become a commitment for Ja net'.

* About Mission u: Each year,

Mission u offers curricula for children, youth, and adults around one biblical or theological theme, with emphasis on spiritual growth, social action, and the global ministry of the church. Mission u 2023: Jesus' teachings in the Gospels proclaim the good news of the kin-dom or reign (basileia) of God. Jesus mentions the kin-dom 90 times in the Synoptic Gospels! What does the Bible tell us about God's basileia, and why do we call it the kin-dom? For Jesus, the kin-dom was not simply something to talk about, but something we could live and experience. From the Lord's Prayer to the Beatitudes to the

NEWS FROM THE DISTRICTS

REFLECTIONS FROM SEATAC MISSIONAL DISTRICT

The SeaTac Missional District of United Women in Faith held its first in-person Annual Meeting on Saturday, September 30, 2023, at Kent United Methodist Church. This was our first in-person gathering since our Annual Meeting in 2019. Everyone who attended was excited to see old faces and make new friends. We had 48 women who attended, more than we had when we held these meetings on Zoom for the past three years. Our District was well represented with women from Auburn First, Beacon, Des Moines, Federal Way, Haller Lake, Kent, Mason (Tacoma), Riverton Park, St. Peter's and Trinity. Additional church women had registered but were unable to join us.

We chose Climate Justice as our social justice focus. Our theme, "For the Beauty of the Earth," was shared by our Keynote Speaker, Rev. Laura Baumgartner, Pastor of Haller Lake United Methodist Church in Seattle and Board Chair of Earth Ministry: Washington Interfaith Power & Light. Her program was interactive and gave us opportunities for discussion with others during the presentation and reflection on the topic. We would encourage you to contact her to present at your unit.

We had a wonderful continental breakfast and soup luncheon from the women at Kent UMC. It is essential for us to have time for socializing and discussing the happenings as the meeting progresses.

Dear United Women in Faith Member,

As part of a sisterhood of women committed to putting faith, hope, and love into action, I am reaching out with an important message.

After much prayer and deep reflection, United Women in Faith is taking several steps to adjust to the organization's current financial reality and remain faithful stewards of the resources entrusted to the organization.

I want you to be among the first to know that due to factors that include a decline in organizational giving, we are enacting a series of cost-saving measures supported by the board of directors who met October 13-14. United Women in Faith will eliminate five staff positions by the end of the year and two additional positions in 2024. We will offer severance, benefits, employment assistance. and education reimbursement to impacted individuals. Please join us in prayer for our affected colleagues, whose good work helped make us the nurturing and impactful sisterhood we are today.

Additionally, we will move our headquarters by the end of the year to the Church Center for the United Nations (CCUN), which we own. This change will mean we will have minimal office space and our staff will work almost fully remotely. You may be aware we changed our mailing address earlier this year to this location.

These measures will help us adapt to a changing church and world, but it was still a difficult and hard decision. As you wrap your mind around this information, please do not lose sight of our mission. United Women in Faith is devoted to uplifting women, children, and youth. I know that in time, like generations of United Women in Faith before us, who survived church disruptions, pandemics, wars, and other societal unrest, we, too, will see brighter days ahead. We will continue to put our love into action. We will see the growth in our giving and membership that we envisioned through our rebranding.

I thank you for your dedication to our beloved organization and solicit your prayers and continued engagement. Please continue to support our missional work with your financial gifts as we build back to the pre-pandemic level. With your consistent giving, we will achieve our goal of being a place for women of faith to find spiritual growth, purpose, belonging, and opportunities for service and advocacy to make an impact in the world. Now is the time to invite women to join us.

Lastly, I know that transitions are difficult. Please know that we are implementing a strategic plan to reposition us for the future to ensure we can be good partners with our communities as well as with women, children, and youth around the world. United Women in Faith wants to be who God has called us to be—united women in faith—and we

need your support to do so. Our ability to thrive depends on you. Let us stand together as the bold, courageous women we have been for 154 years, knowing that with God's help and our love in action, we can change the world.

THE NATIONAL LEGACY FUND ENDOWMENT

LEAVE A LEGACY OF LOVE THROUGH THE ENDOWMENT FUND

In 1997, the United Methodist Women PNW Conference created the Endowment Fund. The fund is invested in the Faith Foundation. The guidelines require that 75 percent of the earnings provide grants for leadership and enrichment opportunities for women and 25 percent goes to Mission Giving. The interest earnings have funded scholarships for Assembly and Western Jurisdiction events and contributions to Pledge to Mission and National Legacy. Grants have been given to Atlantic Street Center, Tacoma Community House, and Nome Community House, and in 2023, each received \$640.

In 2022, we provided \$1,600 for women attending the 2022 Assembly, including the Legacy Banquet. In 2023, we reserved \$1,500 for the May 2024 Western Jurisdiction Quadrennial.

In October, the fund total was \$97,900.59. Our goal is to increase the total to \$100,000. This will generate interest for 2024 projects.

PASTORAL LETTER: PEACE IS OUR WORK, EVERYWHERE



Many people say, "We can't find goodness anywhere. The light of your face has left us, Lord!"
But you have filled my heart with more joy than when their wheat and wine are everywhere!
I will lie down and fall asleep in peace because you alone, Lord, let me live in safety.

–Psalm 4:6-8, CEB

My family still resides in and around Decatur, Alabama. If you search Decatur, Alabama, you will learn that before the conflict in Palestine-Israel escalated to all-out war, Steve Perkins, a 39-year-old African-American man, was shot by several Decatur Police officers. Steve's death on the front lawn of his home invoked outrage across the city and has sparked protests, rallies, memorials, and other calls for justice and peace. I did not know Steve, but I know Steve's plight. I know what it means to be confronted with violence and live with the threat of death every time I leave my home. With Steve's death, we add to the litany of unarmed Black men who died at the hands of state-sanctioned violence. I wonder if even being home is as safe as I tell myself it should be.

My heart aches for Steve's family. It breaks for families in Israel and Gaza already suffering injury and loss. And it will break again for the Palestinians, Israelis and others who will be caught in the crossfire as war rages across the area. With people being held captive by colonialist borders and nationalist policies, there is limited personal and communal agency. With powers from far away dictating strategies and funding war efforts, colonization.

Our high aspiration for peace must always come through acts of justice and insurance of equity. We cannot expect peace if injustice and inequities are commonplace. Our pursuit of peace must begin before we hear gunfire or see bombed-out buildings. That work starts in our homes, neighborhoods, community gathering spaces, and churches as we call out and work against all manner of injustice and inequity especially when we are not the ones directly affected. That's one way we walk in solidarity with those who are unseen, forgotten, mistreated, or dehumanized.

Another way to work for peace in the land is to acknowledge our privilege, dismantle racism, rebut nationalism, and not shy away from calling out discriminatory acts against others. We may feel like the Greater Northwest has its own problems and that those problems are nowhere near as dire as what we are witnessing in Palestine-Israel or Decatur, Alabama, but that is not true.

War anywhere in the world is a sign that everyone has work to do. The only way we bury our heads in the sand is to deny the interconnected nature of life and our globalized economic and war-making alliances. Others may be firing guns and

dropping bombs in Palestine-Israel, Ukraine, Sudan, or Alabama. Still, our country's failure to have difficult conversations, resolve conflict and honor diverse viewpoints keeps us on the brink of war and economic collapse. When we are silent, apathetic, or too busy to bother with it, peace moves farther into the distance. If peace moves away, so does justice and equity.

Amid all that you are facing, holding, and trying to move forward, I pray the weight of these presenting conflicts will not slow or stop you from living as peaceably and boldly as you can. I pray that we will center equity and justice in all the spaces and places of your life to pursue peace constantly, calling attention to the injustice of war-making and antipeace policies and actions – at home and abroad.

As Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. said, "An injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere." May these words serve as a daily reminder that today's war on the other side of the globe impacts and is informed by how we live on this side. Let us not grow weary. Instead, let us continue with hope and in pursuit of peace in every place so that we can fall asleep and live lives in peace.

Peace in Palestine-Israel!
Justice for Steve!
Equity for All!
Amen!
