It seems to be an understatement that we are living in stressful and overwhelming times. I am usually one who advocates for being informed even when it's uncomfortable, but even I have been struggling with listening to the news and keeping up with current events. Everything seems so heavy, be it local, regional, national, or international. And while it's important to accept and acknowledge those feelings, it's even more important not to get paralyzed by them.

This month at our local general meeting (shoutout to the Wesley of Yakima chapter), our speaker was a local pastor who is involved with the immigrant community. Rev. Dr. Christie Love is part of the Yakima Immigrant Response Network which supports our immigrant neighbors in many different ways. I want to share just a few of the notes I took:

- We cannot unpack scripture without connecting it with what's going on in the world today.
- Ubuntu (a familiar word for us UWF-ers!): "My humanity is wrapped up in and depends on your humanity".
- "Imago Dei" ("The image of God") means that nobody's image is more or less valuable than others, regardless of immigration status, race, education...or anything else.
- Don't alienate or add to the division with those on the "other side". Learning to disagree and stay friends is a skill set we're not taught. And to give a bit of hope when things seem overwhelming:
- When everyone is engaging somehow, the whole starts to come together. To quote a climate activist named Shelbizlee, "You cannot do all the good the world needs, but the world needs all the good you can do."

Recently UWF National held a "Solidarity with the Sojourner" webinar which looked at the current U.S. immigration landscape and the challenges and policies that affect migrants. Bishop Julius C. Trimble, General Secretary of the Board of Church and Society of the UMC said "As United Methodists, our Social Principals affirm our commitment to offer support and welcome immigrants, migrants, and refugees into our congregations...[we have a] moral calling to welcome and protect the vulnerable." Finally, I would like to extend Dr. Love's challenge to each of you. "As Christians, we should be able to explain why this is important to us and our faith. [We should] think about this and be able to talk about it". This challenged me, and so I challenge you: what is your reason?

Mission U is a transformative educational program that encompasses both Bible-based curricula and events. All are welcome to engage with either or both components of Mission u.


Interested in deepening your faith in community? Gaining experience interpreting Scripture? Working toward healing for yourself, your community, and all of creation? Mission u is for you!


Each year, United Women in Faith develops three justice-focused Biblical curricula for adults, youth, and children, all on a common theme.




A Message From Our Vice President
